 Roadmap for Success: Local Food in Motion - Southwest Colorado Food Hub Connectivity Location: Theater

Demand for local food is soaring, and while there are many small farms and ranches dedicated to growing food, one of the trickiest problems is how to aggregate and distribute that food in a way that is aligned with the values of a sustainable food system. But what is a Food Hub? What do they actually do? And how can food hubs play an integral role in bridging the gaps in our regional food system to get food from our small farms and ranches to people across the state? Five nonprofits and three food hubs are collaborating on solutions in a 3-year Food Hub Connectivity project funded by the USDA. In this session, we'll hear from Holly Conn, Executive Director of Mountain Roots Food Project in Gunnison, about the project's activities, progress, interim results, and direction, and get a closer look at the inner workings of a food hub from Al Stone and Nick Chambers from Valley Roots Food Hub.

# III. Partnering for Land & Water Conservation: Options for Landowners

The Colorado Water Trust and Colorado Open Lands work statewide with landowners using private property rights to benefit their operations and the environment. A variety of market-based options and funding mechanisms exist to compensate landowners for protecting a property from development, from sharing water rights to benefit streams and other producers, and to assist with land tenure and other challenges. Tools range from short term to permanent agreements which are flexible to meet the custom needs of each landowner with varied geographies and challenges.
